Color should be uniform.
- Exhibits shall consist of one (1) one-half gallon or two (2) one-quart jars (wide-mouth).*
- All farm crops must be of the current year's growth, except corn and buckwheat, which must be the growth of the previous year.*

DEPARTMENT 13 - VEGETABLES

- In selecting vegetables for exhibiting, choose such specimens that would bring the highest market price. Do not select the largest; select medium size specimens. If possible do not mix varieties.*
- The following factors are generally used by vegetable judges:*
 - Trueness to variety type. If possible pick the Specimens from one variety.*
 - Uniformity in shape, size and color.*
 - Pick a perfect specimen, then select the others as similar to it as possible. Do not mix specimens of different maturity.*
 - Protect from dirt, disease, infection and mechanical damage. Select specimens without blemishes.*
 - Condition, maturity and high quality exhibits.*
 - Potatoes should not be washed, remove soil with a soft cloth or brush.*
 - Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc., should have tops (leaves) removed from vegetable, leaving about 2" of stem.*
- Read premium material carefully following all rules and regulations. If an entry calls for five specimens, be sure to exhibit that number, do not enter four or six. In any instance, your exhibits will be disqualified if the correct number is not entered.*
