



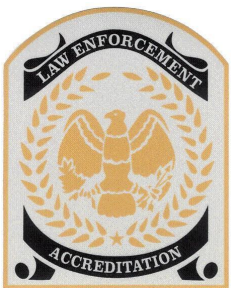

Dear Resident:

It is with great pride that I present to you the annual report for the 2020 calendar year for the Findlay Township Police Department.

This was our second year in our new State of The Art police station. Our Township Leaders invested in the future of the municipality from a public safety perspective in that the new facility will handle the future projected growth in the township. The facility is the envy of most police departments in the area. The facility provides a safe and secure structure that will allow us to keep up with a demanding profession.

By statistical comparison, 2020 was not unlike years past in any one category. Officers patrolled a total of 212,216 miles and investigated or handled 5,107 total complaints for the year. There were 575 fewer complaints investigated in 2020 than there were in 2019. Our criminal arrests in 2020 were 113 compared to 107 in 2019. There was a total of 29 Felony, 103 Misdemeanor, and 80 Summary charges for a total of 212 charges in 2020. In 2019 there were 33 Felony, 99 Misdemeanor and 70 Summary charges for a total of 202 charges. This represents an increase of 10 charges being filed in 2020. The department also conducted 1,854 traffic violator contacts in 2020 in an attempt to reduce the number of traffic accidents in the township. There were 2,276 traffic violator contacts in 2019. This represents a decrease of 422 traffic violator contacts when compared to 2019. These figures were directly affected by COVID-19 protocols which limited self initiated Officer contact dramatically with motorists for approximately 3 months.

The department also provides an invaluable service with its residence/business check program. In 2020, there were a cumulative total of 3997 total residential/business checks conducted by this department.

The department has continued its status as an Internationally and State Accredited law enforcement agency as we were re-accredited again in 2020. The department is one of only nine (9) departments in the state to hold this distinction.

The department maintains its commitment to the West Allegheny School District by providing an officer to teach various programs to our elementary students. These programs are tailored to the changing threats to which our children are exposed. In 2020 our K-9 Unit conducted numerous locker searches at both the High School and Middle School. The department has also partnered with the DEA to facilitate a drug take-back program where residents can turn in any unused prescription medication.

The agency continues to invest in our officer's training. Officers of the department are required to attend drivers training every two years. In the past, the department received funding. In 2020, the department did not receive this necessary funding. As with other specialized training, small departments in today's financial climate are required to do more with less. We have demonstrated that we can be more self-sufficient in this area by combining resources with other agencies in the area to help manage the costs.

The department continues to train its officers in officer response to active shooter and ALERRT, (Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training) by providing refresher training at various schools and office type structures. Officers with our Commercial Vehicle Inspection Team work in partnership with numerous Police

Departments in the area to inspect commercial vehicles in an effort to keep our roadways safe.

As we enter 2021, the Findlay Township Police Department maintains its preparedness to face any and all challenges and remains committed to its citizens by providing a quality service to all of the residents, business owners and visitors of Findlay Township.

The use of force incidents four (4) for 2020 were reviewed and critiqued and found to have been conducted within the policies and procedures set forth by the department and approved by all accreditation standards. Out of 113 criminal arrests and 5,107 calls for service, the Findlay Township Police Officers had only used force four (4) times. This is a very impressive statistic that we are very proud of and a result of our extensive training and the fact that all officers act within the guidelines of the Mission, Vision and Values Statements.

VEHICLE PURSUITS

The Findlay Township Police Officers were involved in three (3) vehicular pursuits in 2020.

TRUCK INSPECTIONS

The Findlay Township Police department has two (2) trained Motor Vehicle Carrier Inspection Officers. Officers Patrick Zilles and Russel Andree. Both of these Officers receive extensive training and are required to recertify annually.

SPECIAL PURPOSE K-9 TEAM

The police department employs one (1) K-9 officer, Sergeant Neil Cridge. Sergeant Cridge and his K-9 Scooby received extensive training in order to become a fully trained K-9 Officer. K-9 Scooby was utilized in more than one way. The following is a summary of the activities of the K-9 unit:

- Tracking: 3

- Warrant service: 1

The Sports and Recreation Complex were patrolled approximately 34 times throughout the year by the K-9 Team.

K-9's Scooby was utilized to perform locker searches at the West Allegheny High School, Middle School and assisted with searches of multiple other schools in neighboring jurisdictions.

It should be noted that K-9 Scooby was off the road for approximately 5 months due to injury and loss of a vehicle as a result of Sergeant Cridge and K-9 Scooby's handling of a volatile criminal incident.

Each Police Officer has received approximately 100 hours of training and each Communications Officer has received approximately 50 hours of training in 2020. The training aspect of the department is one of the most important because it affords the members an opportunity to become more adept at their individual positions which ultimately provides a professional service to the public. In 2020, we continue to require all Police and Communications Officers (where appropriate) to conduct a department structured personal review, departmental review, and comprehensive testing of the twenty-two (22) FTPD highest risk Policies and Procedures including Use of Force, Use of Deadly Force, Search and Seizure, Arrest Procedures, Domestic Violence, Crimes Victims / Witnesses, Special Operations, Evidence Collection, Interview / Interrogation, Vehicle Pursuits, Homeland Security, etc. This comprehensive training is invaluable and is conducted during Police Officer and Communications Officer time when not actively on calls, investigations, or other patrol related activities.

- Utilize McGruff at community events.
- Continually evaluate and assess juvenile crime throughout Findlay Township and the West Allegheny School District in order to assess possible solutions or crime prevention programs that could assist in the reduction of juvenile crime.
- Maintain a close working relationship with the school district and the local district magistrate in devising a plan to deal with juvenile offenders involved in minor offenses and offer community service.
- Work closely with the school district and the local district magistrate in devising plans to reduce truancy.
